European Charter for Regional or Minority Languages

- For a long time minority languages could only be spoken in the family.
- Today, the Charter obliges the authorities to ensure that our language is used everywhere in public again.
- You too can use our language, with the authorities, in shops, in hospitals, for family and place names, etc.
- ► Have your say!





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- In many families, regional or minority languages have been spoken for generations.
- ► It is therefore natural that we speak our language with our relatives and friends.
- Don't be the first not to pass on the language to your children after so many centuries!
- ► Keep on talking!





WE DO IT FREELY AND FOR EVERYONE TO HEAR.

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Speaking a regional or minority language in public isn't embarrassing, impolite or forbidden.

- lt's our right and it's completely normal.
- ► Speak up everywhere and every day!





LET'S GO GET OUR LANGUAGE!

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- The Charter allows us to ask, in our own language, for oral and written information or services in this language.
- Even if you don't get a reply in our language at first, insist on its use every day. Don't feel like you're being a nuisance you're helping to keep our language alive!
- **▶** Don't let them brush you off!





I'M NOT A TOURIST. THIS IS MY HOME!

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- A regional or minority language is not a foreign language.
- ► It has been spoken by people from this region for centuries.
- Nobody should be surprised when we speak our own language in public, even though we can also speak the majority language.
- **Keep speaking** it, even if you are mistaken for a tourist!
